From your Parish Council



et me start with the good news! There were 15 of your Parish Councillors and fellow villagers at this year's Village Litter Pick on 30th May. And a rubbish time was had by all, pun intended! All roads, verges and public land from the village gates to the east to those to the west were thoroughly covered before we reconvened at the Village Hall for a cuppa. As NNDC couldn't loan us the equipment because of Covid restrictions, we purchased and used our own. This also gives us flexibility to carry out a litter pick whenever we want. Many villagers routinely pick up litter they see in the Village. We are making this equipment available on loan to any that wish to use it. This can include a picker, hoop, sack and hi-viz jacket (if required). Contact me if



you would like to borrow any of the equipment. Thanks to all volunteers and the Village Hall for its hospitality. We will be organising more village litter picks during the year. Watch this space for details.

The not-so-good news was the discovery that the buildings of the disused Pineheath Care Home were not only insecure and apparently not patrolled but contained unsecured personal data of ex-residents and staff. Norfolk County Council, the local authority who oversee personal care, have acted promptly to secure the records and building. If you, or anyone you know, has concerns about the personal data, they can be

raised with the Information Commissioner's Office via <u>https://ico.org.uk/make-a-complaint/your-personal-information-concerns.</u>

There's still time to let the Parish Clerk have your entry for the next High Kelling Directory. Entries are still coming in. Have you submitted yours? The short form is in previous copies of the Parish Chronicle or a copy can be provided by the Parish Clerk, a Parish Councillor or myself.

We continue to look at ways to celebrate the return to 'normal village life', post-restrictions. If you would like to join in with the discussions and organising, please contact me.

The Planning System Part 2

e outlined how the Planning System in North Norfolk works in Issue No.2 in February. Here we look in more detail at what factors are taken into account by North Norfolk District Council (NNDC) in making decisions about planning applications and how villagers and the Parish Council can contribute to the process. Most planning applications are straightforward. They are for minor works and architects and builders know the policies and regulations which the District Council will use, but some applications can be more contentious.

If you want to comment on a Planning Application

NNDC notifies those who may be affected, as well as the Parish Council of planning applications. These can be viewed on the NNDC Planning website at https://www.north-norfolk.gov.uk/tasks/development-management/view-and-comment-on-a-planning-application/

But how do you make a relevant comment when most of us are not planning experts? The Material Planning Considerations handout below is a useful general summary and can be found on the NNDC website. Although it was produced a few years ago and planning policy is constantly evolving, it gives a useful practical indication of the kinds of issues which are considered, eg loss of sunlight, loss of privacy, building design and highways matters, as well as issues NOT considered eg loss of view, impact on property value and problems associated with construction.

In relation to High Kelling, in particular, it is evident from past planning decisions that significant issues include: access onto the busy A148 because many side roads have restricted views; the countryside environment because much of the village is within the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty; and there is a Tree Preservation Order covering the whole village (see May issue of the Chronicle).

North Norfolk District Council Planning Decisions

NNDC takes account of

i) national planning priorities and policies, the most important of which is the National Planning Policy Framework

ii) the Local Plan which sets out the long-term vision for the District. <u>https://www.north-norfolk.gov.uk/media/5033/first-draft-local-plan-may-</u> <u>2019.pdf</u> It includes policies which will be used to determine future planning applications. It is a long document (over 300 pages) but Part 9 Housing Policies is particularly relevant, especially the sections dealing with Replacement Dwellings, House Extensions & Annexed Accommodation and Re-Use of Rural Buildings in the Countryside.

This describes the current planning system but a new Planning Bill was announced in the Queen's Speech, which many see as relaxing the rules and weakening local involvement

If you are going to comment on a planning application, it would be helpful if you send or email a copy to highkellingclerk@gmail.com because you may have more detailed knowledge that the Parish Council should be made aware of.

Sheringham Shoal and Dudgeon Offshore Windfarm Extension Projects Update - Cllr John Mangan

In February and May, we reported that the Offshore Coordination Project was moving forward with much enthusiasm for the concept of an Offshore Transmission Network (OTN) to coordinate the transmission of offshore generated power from multiple windfarms onto land and onward to the National Grid. The key to this Project is collaboration and it involves the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS), Ofgen, ESO and National Grid. This is a long term Project but existing developers of projects in process are being encouraged to become involved and to act as pathfinders to find ways of collaboration between developers and stakeholders, without negatively impacting their existing project.

The upshot of this is that we will not see any change to Hornsey Project 3 or the Sheringham and Dudgeon Extension projects continuing to progress their respective cable laying activities but we may see a degree of collaboration between the two to minimise impact of the construction work.

The Phase 2 Consultation period for Equinor's Project ended on 10th June, during which residents were invited to submit comments on the Project. Your PC has been involved in this Consultation and we continue to keep you informed of developments.

A positive development for High Kelling that was noted in the cable routing now proposed, was its reversion back to Equinor's original proposals, crossing the A148 to the East of Bodham and missing High Kelling by a substantial margin.

Motor Neurone Disease:

A rewarding way to make a difference locally

Do you enjoy listening to and helping people? Are you looking for a volunteering role which fits in around your family, work, studies and other commitments? By giving just a few hours a week you could make a huge impact.

As an Association Visitor for the Motor Neurone Disease (MND) Association, you would maintain contact with people with MND, their families and carers by phone, email, via online platforms, or with face to face visits, when permitted. The role is a challenging but rewarding one. By offering confidential emotional support, information and help to access the right services, you can enable people affected by MND to live their lives more easily.

About motor neurone disease (MND):

- MND is a fatal, rapidly progressing disease that affects the brain and spinal cord.
- It attacks the nerves that control movement so muscles no longer work. MND does not usually affect the senses such as sight, sound, feeling etc.
- It can leave people locked in a failing body, unable to move, talk and eventually breathe.
- Over 80% of people with MND will have communication difficulties, including for some, a complete loss of voice.
- It affects people from all communities.
- It kills a third of people within a year and more than half within two years of diagnosis.
- A person's lifetime risk of developing MND is around 1 in 300.
- Six people per day are diagnosed with MND in the UK.
- It affects up to 5,000 adults in the UK at any one time.
- It kills six people per day in the UK, this is just under 2,200 per year.
- It has no cure.

About the MND Association:

- The MND Association was founded in 1979 by a group of volunteers with experience of living with or caring for someone with MND.
- The MND Association focuses on improving access to care, research and campaigning for those people living with or affected by MND in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The Norfolk Churches Trust Sponsored Bike Ride – John Mangan

Did you know that Norfolk has the largest concentration of medieval churches in the world? With such a large number, many of which have significant historical status, the cost of maintaining and preserving them for the future is significant.

The Norfolk Churches Trust is a body that was established to assist in this process, and works tirelessly organising activities to raise funds that are distributed throughout the County directly to the Churches. The Norfolk Churches Sponsored Bike Ride is one such activity.

Every year, on a nominated date in September, bikers throughout the County pedal around visiting churches that have been sponsored. Each biker chooses a church to benefit, and half of the money collected goes to the chosen



church with the other half going to the Trust. The Trust then allocates the remaining funds to churches in most need.

Every year, Alan Taylor and John Mangan take part in the Ride and will be taking to the saddle once again this year on Saturday, 11th September, with the chosen church being All Saints in the Village.

Did you know?

Do you know the difference between http and https?

The main difference between http://and https:// is it's all about keeping you secure. HTTP stands for Hyper Text Transfer Protocol. The "S" stands for "secure". If you visit a website or web page and look at the address in the web browser, it will likely begin with the following: <u>http:///</u>.

This means that the website is talking to your browser using the regular "unsecured" language. In other words, it is possible for someone to "eavesdrop" on your computer's conversation with the website. If you fill out a form on the website, someone might see the information you send to that site.

This is why you never ever enter your credit card number in an http website! But if the web address begins with <u>https://</u>, that basically means your computer is talking to the website <u>in a secure code</u> that no one can eavesdrop.

If a website ever asks you to enter your credit card information, you should automatically look to see if the web address begins with <u>https://</u>.

If it doesn't, you should NEVER enter sensitive information such as a credit card number, etc.

Could you save a life?



Over the past few years, local residents have attended a training course on how to deal with an unconscious casualty by the use of CPR (Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation). Where there is no response, you will be shown the method to deploy a Defibrillator to shock the casualty, hopefully, back to life.

Now with numerous new neighbours in our village, are there any volunteers, some as a refresher, and others as an introduction, to

using the defibrillator?

The training will be completed at the Village Hall, and last approx. 1 hour.
