Their experience and knowledge will be sadly missed. We therefore have two vacancies on the Parish Council. Filling them will be either by a formal election or by the Parish Council co-opting. By the time you read this, Colin and Jan will be enjoying a very well-deserved retirement from managing the village store and Post Office. On behalf of the village, may I thank them for all they have done to provide us with the essentials of life. The store has been a saviour to many during the pandemic, and Colin has always managed to get our newspapers delivered despite everything. Happily, both are remaining in High Kelling with Jan as a Parish Councillor.

It would be remiss of me not to mention the great work done by John Kellas-Kelly and the rest of the Village Hall Management Committee in looking after your Village Hall, making it Covid-secure and preparing it for opening in May where once again it will become the centre of village life.

As a Parish Council, we are committed to engaging and communicating with villagers. We have a regular working party devoted entirely to this. Having looked at the responses from the village survey, we are working on a number of ideas including not only improving communication but also a village celebration, showing our appreciation to our NHS, planting and enhancing the village, not to mention safety on the A148. On the subject of communicating itself, The High Kelling Parish

High Kelling Tree Preservation Order

he High Kelling TPO covers all residential areas in High Kelling and was confirmed by North Norfolk District Council for the **whole** of High Kelling in May 2016 (Reference Number TPO/16/0917). The full order can be found on the NNDC website: Planning and Design section at http://acolnet.north-norfolk.gov.uk/Trees/

The Area TPO protects all the trees in High Kelling. A 10-year review is written into the order. It does not stop appropriate works.

An application (no fee) can be made and advice is given about the best course of action from Simon Case at NNDC. Some applications can be dealt with by email without a site visit being necessary. Most applications take around 3 weeks. By law they must be dealt with in 9 weeks.

Appropriate pruning of fruit trees is allowed.


Dead branches and dead trees are not covered by the TPO.

The TPO does not stop thinning of trees. An application can be made and advice would be given on thinning and replanting.

A 'tree' includes saplings which will grow into a tree, but in practice it would cover trees with a trunk over 3 inches in diameter at waist-height.

Hedges and shrubs are not covered by the TPO.

Protection of trees is a planning issue and has to be accommodated in the development of properties. If you wish to carry out work on trees within High Kelling, further information and an application form is available on the NNDC website https://www.north-norfolk.gov.uk/tasks/conservation/how-do-i-apply-to-carry-out-work-to-protected-trees/



Offshore Wind Turbines

- here are three major areas of activity on the Offshore Power Generation front that affect High Kelling and are gaining pace:
 - 1. Hornsea Project Three. By now many of you will have received a copy of the April 2021 Community Newsletter from Oersted on the Hornsea Project Three (HP3) Offshore Windfarm. HP3 was approved for development on 1st Jan 2021, and Oersted have not wasted time in initiating the land acquisition needed for the onshore cable run, as evident from a number of Planning Notices around High Kelling, already noted in February's Chronicle. The Newsletter makes no mention of the Offshore Transmission Network (OTN), but whether the OTN will have some influence to bear in time remains to be seen. If you don't receive the Newsletter but would like to, just drop an Email to HornseaProjectThree@orsted.co.uk.
 - 2. <u>Sheringham Shoal and Dudgeon Extensions</u>. Following the circulation in early March of Equinor's February Community News-

letter, your Parish Council submitted concerns that none of the concerns and requests that we had been making over the previous months had been taken into account nor even appear to have been considered, specifically: a) the widening of the scoping area for the cable routing, bringing the possibility of it following a route close to the Hornsea Project 3 route parallel to Pineheath Road, and b) committing to embracing the OTN project for a better onshore transmission solution. This Extensions Project is still in its preapproval stage and is roughly around a year and a half behind Hornsea Project 3, so should still be open to amendment. We shall keep trying. Your Parish Council will be represented at their Online Stakeholder Forum later in April so we shall report back in the next Chronicle.

3. Offshore Transmission Network Review (OTNR). In July 2020, the Government recognised that, with the commitment to a zero carbon policy to energy generation by 2050 and the resulting acceleration of offshore generation capacity that would be needed, traditional transmission methods that had previously been assumed to be appropriate would not be compatible under the new regime. In other words, there has to be a better way to bring power ashore and to the National Grid than digging a separate trench and laying separate cables for each new windfarm. The OTNR was launched under the Department for Business, Energy and industrial Strategy (BEIS) and covers four areas, or workstreams, namely: near term, medium term and long term opportunities for a coordinated approach across contractors; and the early introduction of Multi-Purpose Interconnectors to allow offshore grouping of different windfarm outputs. National Grid Electricity System Operator (ESO) works across all four workstreams to ensure a co-ordinated approach to these four offshore workstreams. The benefits of their efforts were clear from our report in the February Chronicle on their Offshore Coordination Project Phase 1. We are fortunate in that the five MPs for areas affected in Norfolk and Suffolk are united and active at Government level in their support for the OTNR and our own MP Duncan Baker will be joining our next Parish Council Meeting to brief us on progress from his own perspective. We should be able to report back on this in the May Bulletin.

So a lot of activity is building up and there is much more information out there on the various bodies' websites and in their publications. Whilst Offshore Renewable Energy is the right way to go and is being pursued by the Government with vigour, if you have any concern for your countryside, be heard and voice your thoughts to Equinor, Oersted, the National Grid, Vattenfall and all similarly involved organisations to encourage them to embrace Offshore Transmission Network and modify their approaches accordingly. Copy your communications to your local MP Duncan Baker, to NNDC Major Projects Geoff Lyons, Norfolk Council and NNDC Leader Sarah Butikofer, even the Secretary of State for BEIS Kwasi Kwarteng. You may feel you're at the bottom of the chain but local opinion does matter, does have impact and is taken note of; all the way up to the Top.



What has Been Happening in our Village

Speed Watch

E'RE BACK!

High Kelling has no doubt noticed that our Community Speed Watch (CSW) teams have been absent during the worst of the lock-down. But as from the 5th April, when meetings outdoors of six people became legal, activities have resumed.

CSW is run under the auspices of the Norfolk Constabulary – now somewhat merged with Suffolk. Organised on a parish by parish basis, teams are provided with a radar speed measuring 'gun' and other bits and pieces so that they may patrol the highway and report back to the Police if offenders exceeding the speed limit are detected.

A team of three or more volunteers turn out, usually for one hour at a time. It is a Police requirement that team members each wear a yellow hi-viz jacket of approved pattern and that notices are put out at a distance of 100 yards or more on each side of the monitoring site. Before joining a team, volunteers' are checked by the Police for any criminal or such records.

The members of the team are volunteers and have no powers to take any legal action except to file a report with Norfolk Constabulary at the end of each session with details of the offenders detected. The information provided is the registration number, the colour, the make and model of the car, van, lorry or whatever, the time of the observation and the speed detected.

The Police then check the details – especially to double check that the vehicle details correspond with the national database – and if all is correct a letter is sent to the registered owner of the offending vehicle. Repeat offenders should get a visit from a uniformed policeman to be told the error of their ways.

CSW has no enforcement powers, and it has to be admitted that in High Kelling where the team and their notice boards are all too visible, during a monitoring session very few offenders are seen. But this is the point – the speed limit is largely observed while the team is there. What is more, the team do get noticed and word goes round that we have a CSW team here and maybe some understanding follows that High Kelling is a place where keeping to the speed limit is important.

The Humble Toads Have Come and Gone

ur February edition ran a short piece describing the annual antics of toads when it comes to the spawning time and the strange (to some) antics of a band of volunteers who arm themselves with buckets, wellies, hi-viz jackets and torches, and spend a few hours after sunset helping the toads across the road at Selbrigg Pond rather than leave them to become victims of unforgiving car and van tyres.

Well, the migration is now over and we can report that 5603 toads, 195 frogs and 58 newts were saved from the traffic with only 61 toads and 1 newt recorded as casualties over the period.

Once again Selbrigg ranked as the highest scoring patrol in Norfolk and, I'm told, one of the top five in the country. Toads are on the decline in the UK so this is a very worthwhile activity and a chance to do something for the wildlife. It will happen again next year so if it appeals to you, don't be backward about coming forward!

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
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
