#### From your Parish Council

#### **Councillors**

At the meeting of the Parish Council on 28<sup>th</sup> November we welcomed a new member, Sally Monkman, who brings a wealth of experience to the Council. This means that we now have eight of the nine positions filled. Is there anyone else in the village who would like to be considered for co-option?



#### <u>Highways</u>

Following the meeting with Steve White of Norfolk County Council Highways Department, some of the footpaths in the village have had debris removed and growth cut back, and this has improved the width of the footpath in many areas. We are now waiting for a white line to be installed along the side of the kerb adjacent to the footpath on the A148 which will hopefully result in traffic keeping a little further away from the footpath.

We discussed with Steve the issues we have in crossing the road because of the speed and volume of the traffic. The road is unfortunately too narrow to accommodate an island crossing but consideration is being given to the installation of new signs warning drivers of pedestrians crossing the road. Many of the existing signs need cleaning or replacement and this is something else that Steve is looking at.

#### **Speeding**

The Parish Council had hoped that we could persuade the police to allow us to purchase a speed warning sign on the A148 that would not only advise motorists of the speed of their vehicle but also identify the number plate if the vehicle exceeded the speed limit. Such cameras have been trialed in Suffolk but have not been authorised yet in Norfolk.

Whilst we received support for the trial from Duncan Baker MP, we have not been able to persuade the police so at this stage we will go ahead and purchase the standard SAM2 camera which is in use in many other villages on the A148. I am pleased to report that Councillor Eric Vardy has agreed to make a contribution towards the cost of the SAM2 and an application is being made for further funding under the Norfolk County Council Parish Partnership Scheme.

The Parish Council also discussed the issue of speed on Bridge Road where unfortunately the national speed limit of 60mph applies. We will be looking at whether

there is anything that can be done to reduce speeds on this road, particularly as there are several junctions and access points from the Rugby Club and it is regularly used by pedestrians and cyclists. One suggestion is that we arrange for a further set of village gates to be installed on Bridge Road and next year we will explore the cost of this and any funding opportunities.

#### Full Fibre Broadband

On the issue of Full Fibre Broadband, it is good to report that Upp Broadband (which has recently purchased by Virgin Media O2) are pressing ahead with plans to install Full Fibre to the village. The Parish Council are waiting to hear from Upp as to the precise locations of the cables, particularly where these are going to be on private roads. Openreach have already installed the cabling for Warren Road and it is hoped that within the next 12 months Full Fibre Broadband will be available to all properties in High Kelling.

#### **Defibrillators**

The defibrillator at the Village Hall is going to need to be replaced in the near future. Lynne Henderson from the Village Hall Committee has been looking to see how this can be funded and, provided the application for funding is made by the Parish Council rather than the Trustees of the Village Hall, we hope to be able to obtain full funding from the British Heart Foundation. In the meantime, the defibrillator at the Village Hall is still fully working and is being maintained.

#### The next meeting of the Parish Council . . .

... will take place on Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2024 at 7pm in the Village Hall. If any villager would like to speak to me on any issue of concern ahead of the meeting, I would be pleased to do so and will be at the Village Hall from 6.15pm on that day.

#### News from your Village Hall Committee

#### Village Hall Activity Groups

In 2023 we have been blessed by a greater number of activity groups using the Village Hall and we are delighted to have received much appreciation from those groups. Of course, those groups and occasional



users have contributed a great deal of money towards the overheads which has enabled the Committee to maintain the standards expected by our patrons, including all village residents.

#### Village Hall Maintenance

To give villagers an indication of our costs, each year Village Hall insurance is in excess of £2k. In recent months we have undertaken some niggly and urgent repairs, such as central heating and plumbing faults, and we have addressed repairs soon after reports of the defects were received.

#### **Village Hall Improvements**

For some time, the Village Hall Committee has been compiling "The Big Plan". Early next year, as part of this, we intend to draw up plans for possible enhancements to improve the Village Hall, focussing on our energy footprint and funding possibilities.

#### Village Hall Committee

Last month we sought more Village Hall Committee members; this is likely to result in the appointment of two new committee members, one of whom could become the new Bookings Secretary in place of Silvia Carter (see below). If so, the committee will be in a better position to support the High Kelling Village Hall Charity in line with the Constitution and the Charity Commission's requirements. In the past there were 15 or so Committee Members at any one time; currently there are just eight trustees, so it is not too late for you to consider joining us if you wish.

#### **Village Hall Volunteers**

We are very grateful that some villagers have asked for their names to be added to our list of Village Hall Volunteers on an ad hoc basis, when they are available, to assist with background activities or events or both. If you would like to express an interest in any role please contact me or the Village Hall Secretary; contact details are at the end of this article.

#### Village Hall Bookings Secretary

As mentioned last month, shortly we will be saying goodbye to Silvia Carter who is to stand down from her role as Bookings Secretary during January. In preparation for standing down, Silvia has reviewed the needs of client clubs and organisations for 2024 and has prepared handover notes on her duties to give her successor a good start in this crucial role, for which we are extremely grateful.

The Folk Music Pub Night on 24<sup>th</sup> November, organised by Sean Doran, was a great success, providing over 60 people with excellent entertainment over three sessions between 7.30 and 10pm.

Sean Doran and Chris Halsall provided the warm-up with a set of classic Irish folk songs blending a medley of instruments, including guitar, mandolin, bouzouki and banjo.

Headliners John and Pauline Pearce then performed two sets of intelligent, humorous and emotional songs, taking the audience on a journey ranging from the sparkling Northern Lights, the church bells of old Dunwich town and the card sharps of Great Yarmouth.

A handicap system was used to ensure that all participants had a reasonable opportunity to win, the strongest player conceding 12 points, the least strong 0, with the average of around 5 and 6. All games were played to 21 points.

The players topping their respective leagues were Colin Humphreys, Chris Larkins, Peter Offord and Peter Pazda. Colin and Peter Pazda (the strongest players in the Club) then proceeded to the Final itself. In a very hard fought contest, Colin finally triumphed by 21-18 and 21-13.

#### SOCIAL WALKING

I have recently had several conversations with friends and neighbours where we have discussed the subject of walking locally. It transpires that some people aren't comfortable or just prefer not to walk alone and would very much like to have like-minded people to accompany them.

I appreciate that there are other organisations that have similar systems in place but I very much prefer to 'do my own thing' on a daily basis. Different factors determine the time and distance that I choose to walk. In that regard I do not wish to have an arranged walk at a specific regular time or day.

I have given quite a lot of thought to this and am prepared to set up a closed WhatsApp group whereby participants can dip into this group on a daily basis and make contact with other members, expressing their wishes to go walking. I do not wish to be 'in charge' of this group but hope that High Kelling residents who wish to participate can get together for local walks as the mood takes them.

Of course, it is imperative that nobody advertises publicly when their properties would be empty. I think that if any interested parties could contact me at first via email in order for me to assess the level of interest.

If this idea is successful there is no reason that it has to be exclusively for walking. Maybe those less able would prefer to meet on a social basis. For example, for a coffee and chat at the garden centre or Kelling Heath Holiday Park when the shop or café are open. Also, a general 'meet-up' location might be preferable, for example, at the Millennium Seat on the green at Pineheath Road.
