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#### **Editorial Note**

This month's local elections have resulted in big changes in the composition of the Parish Council (see opposite page). Cllrs David Carter, Gordon Lane, John Mangan have stood down, while Philip Fejer, Maureen Pearman and Susan Rutherford join current Cllrs Duncan Henderson, Jan Kemp and Peter Rutherford.

Special thanks are due to David Carter for his Chairmanship of the Parish Council since 2019, a role he took on shortly after stepping down from chairing the Trustees of the Village Hall for several years. We shall miss his dedication and commitment to the interests and wellbeing of the village, and his skilful management of the bimonthly Parish Council meetings. Not least among his achievements was ensuring the reinstatement of the post-box on Pineheath Road and the installation of a defibrillator in the former telephone box on the A148, small but nevertheless important amenities for village residents. First and foremost, however, he was the driving force behind the Parish Council taking over the publication of a regular village newsletter in the form of the *Chronicle*.

The Deputy Chair, Gordon Lane, has been for several years the lead on matters relating to highways and footpaths within the village, particularly in relation to traffic speed on the A148. He also took a literally hands-on approach to keeping the village tidy, whether by clearing debris from the A148 footpaths, mowing the grass on the Pineheath Road dog-leg or righting the bollard on that road after it had been knocked over (yet again) by a delivery lorry.

Patrick Kelly could be relied upon to adopt the role of 'elder statesman', listening patiently to the views of others before offering up a considered and thoughtful consensus position which, more often than not, would then win the day.

John Mangan was our expert on wind-energy matters, liaising with other local bodies and pressure groups in seeking to minimise the impact of the supply cables on our Area of Outstanding Local Beauty.

Niki Doran brought a new perspective to the Parish Council and we hope she will be able to return when her current work commitments allow.

Our thanks to all departing Councillors for their service to the village.

#### The Coronation of King Charles III

Wonderful to know that the village is coming together to celebrate the Coronation. Tickets for the Sunday Big (Buffet) Lunch on Sunday, 7<sup>th</sup> May are sold out, the food, drink and celebratory cake has been ordered, and the Village Hall is being



suitably decorated. It promises to be an event comparable to last year's Jubilee celebration.

It will be a great way to celebrate the Coronation and socialise with fellow villagers. The Old Rock Shop Bistro in Cromer is providing the finger buffet; I can whole-heartedly recommend their food. Vegetarian options are of course available, and the Bar will be open. Thank you to everyone involved in organising the event; the Village Hall and your Parish Council are sharing the greater part of the cost of the event.

The month of May is a natural turning point in the year. #### **Green Village**

Earlier this year Cllr Patrick Kelly attended an EcoChurch meeting about local initiatives being taken to protect the environment. Reasons of space have precluded inclusion of his report in previous issues, but it is now set out below.

The Parish Council continues to make links with other groups having an interest in protecting the environment. On 6<sup>th</sup> February an EcoChurch meeting was held at St Andrew's, Holt to exchange information about local developments.

EcoChurch is an award scheme for churches who wish to improve their environmental impact, and St Andrew's has recently been granted the accolade of a bronze award. A lot of work has been undertaken in the Churchyard, including managing a wild area, planting vegetation and hosting a number of beehives. The Church also holds an annual litter pick and will be collaborating with other groups to record sightings of flora and fauna for the 'Count on Nature' project scheduled for June. It is also hoping to trial the *Terracycle* scheme for collecting toothpaste and other dental waste.

It was noted that, given the amount of work undertaken recently at All Saints Church in High Kelling, including the planting of trees to mark the Platinum Jubilee and the construction of a 'bug hotel', it might qualify for an EcoChurch silver award!

The Greening Holt initiative has been active around the town installing bird, insect and bat boxes, planting trees. A reusable coffee cup scheme was introduced recently. Future ideas include a Holt Open Gardens planned for 2024.

#### **Signs of Spring**

Another local nature feature by Pineheath Road resident Jane Fejer



Autumn and winter past, where nature has slumbered and the sounds of the pink- footed geese, with their chevron flight and honking sounds no longer filling the skyscape above the village. Breath no longer seen on the air.

Nights becoming shorter, the days longer. Sunrises are earlier with hues of pinks and reds, preceded by the 'blue hour' early morning with daily changes to the dawn. Warming and welcoming with new spring scents felt in the air.

Walking past the tree-lined tarmac river, with its thunderous sounds, towards Bodham. A panoramic window opens up, where the scene of morning greets the day, where at times the open fields and hedgerows are covered in early sea mists travelling up from the coast hugging the bare-branched tree-tops.

Turning into the entrance to the woods we are greeted by blackbirds scurrying along at our feet, no fear shown, not even with the dog (Morse) walking alongside, nose busy to catch the scents of early morning. They accompany us as we disturb the path for them to grab whatever they can to eat.

Spring equinox brings the early daily awakening of the skies above as well as the stirrings to trigger the new seasons of nature. These, summoned upon by the increase in sunlight, start to wake up with these early beginnings. The branches, once covered in frosted blanket of winter, change in colour to warming sunlight tones as the water rises up fast within the trunk to the crown.



There is then a hurry, a surge through the woodland and within gardens, covering them with a blanket of snowdrops, then nodding heads of yellow and white daffodils amongst the still-faded autumn leaves. Finally, bluebells begin to spread their blue glow, while the trees still await the budding of their leaves to form a light green canopy and bring their filtered light to the woodland floor.

To accompany nature's awakening, the birdsong is becoming louder heralding the new dawn and dusk. Birds mark out their territories, with new brighter plumage of feathers. Nest-boxes to find and new nesting sites to secure. The rooks' louder caws form a bass note to the robins' first call of the day. Dawn chorus, nature's symphony.

Gathering apace, this rush hour of nature to get things started, Lambs-tails' catkins start the tree-flowering, followed by blackthorn's sweet white blossom. Then the pink and white cherry-tree blossom and magnolias. This symphony of colour and the 'budding' of leaves that uncurl to welcome their new year.

Spring has arrived.

#### Don't forget the Local Government elections on 4th May . . .

. . . but remember that under new UK government legislation all persons voting in person at a polling station now need to provide photographic identification before being issued with a ballot paper.

Accepted forms of photographic identification include:

- a passport;
- a driving licence;
- an identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) hologram;
- an Older Person's Bus Pass;
- a Disabled Person's Bus Pass;
- a Blue Badge.

Although there are alternatives for persons not holding one of the accepted forms of identification (namely, a free Voter Authority Certificate or a postal vote), the deadlines for applying for these in time for this month's elections have now passed.
